HELP OUR FIREFIGHTERS: THE IMPORTANCE OF GORSE REMOVAL

The Victorian Gorse Taskforce (VGT) and the Country Fire Authority (CFA) produced an educational flyer about the importance of gorse removal in relation to our firefighters safety.

Our Extension Officer, Brydie Murrihy and Lindsay Barry, the Operations Officer for the CFA worked together to create an educational flyer about the dangers that gorse can pose when there are bushfires. "People seemed to really respond to the fact that we had CFA representatives

BIOLOGICAL CONTROLS: A WAY FORWARD FOR GORSE MANAGEMENT?

Brydie Murrihy, the VGT Extension Officer, represented the Victorian Gorse Taskforce (VGT) at the biological control workshop held in Daylesford by the Hepburn Shire in October.

The workshop was run by Brian Bainbridge of the Hepburn Shire and Greg LaFoe from Agricultural Victoria. They talked about the progress of biological controls, such as moths or mites, for Cape Broom species and also Gorse.

"Although the Broom species have had greater success in this area, it was very interesting to learn about the Gorse soft shoot moth having success in Tasmania," Brydie recalls. Greg LaFoe explained in the workshop that these moths eat the soft shoots that would later normally become flowers on the gorse plants. There has been large success in Tasmania with these moths and scientists have released a population in Victoria but are waiting for the population to grow before they tell the public the release spot to protect the species from overharvesting.

"It's a promising space and something to look forward too in years to come!" says a happy VGT Extension officer, Brydie Murrihy. at our demonstration days and didn't understand fully the dangers that gorse poses if it's burning," Brydie explains, "So I asked Lindsay to assist me in creating a resource that demonstrated gorse as a fire threat"

The flyer developed (below) was shared to the VGT social media accounts and was quickly shared throughout other public and private pages. It has reached over 5,000 people since it was published on the first of October.

In addition, the flyer was distributed to 13 Community Engagement Coordinators of the CFA who distributed it throughout the appropriate brigades. It has been taken to shows and community days run by the CFA and will be continued to be brought to similar events, run by both organisations, well into the future. The Victorian Gorse Taskforce (VGT) and the Country Fire Authority (CFA) urge you to control your gorse before this fire season. Gorse poses a serious danger to our firefighters. It's high oil content makes it extremely flammable and ignites from sparks

ahead of a bushfire. It gives off a large amount of radiant heat creating natural blockers for firefighters to access other fires. Gorse fires are difficult for firefighters to bring under control. So do your bit, control your gorse now and help our firefighters!
